MEETINGS

SPEAKERS

- January was members' night. Several members shared photos, Scott Denkers on a Florida trip, Denis Knopp on rare species seen around BC, Janet Pollock on birds at the GBHNR and Janne Perrin on nature close to home.
- Aleesha Switzer spoke on the rare (Oregon Spotted frog) & common (Pacific Chorus) amphibians of BC in February. Many are now listed species. She encouraged members to report their observations to <u>Frog Finders</u>.
- 3. In March Gregg Breed, now at the University of Alaska in Fairbanks, spoke on Climate-driven changes in northeastern US *butterfly* communities. Southern species are moving north and northern species numbers are falling.

FIELD TRIPS

- Many members enjoyed the annual Hope River-Corbold Park winter walk on January 22nd, a fine sunny day. In total 24 species of birds were seen including common goldeneye, varied thrush, trumpeter swans and both red and yellow-shafted northern flickers.
- 2. On February 12, another nice day, we visited Brown Creek, a restored wetland that hosts many birds.



We recorded 23 species with the noisy belted

kingfishers and Bewick's wrens serenading us. Lunch on the patio at a Yarrow cafe was a pleasant ending to the trip.

3. Weather again smiled on us for our March 5th annual trip to observe the nesting great blue herons at the local reserve. The herons were busy building and defending their stick nests high in the cottonwoods with the bald eagle looking on. 33 species were submitted to e-bird with a white-throated sparrow and a sharp-shinned hawk gracing the list.
