He has consulted on Peregrine falcons in Abbotsford and has done a lot of raptor surveys through the province. Otherwise a speaker on Bioacoustics in wild life surveys will talk via Zoom.

FIELD TRIPS

- 1. Camp River Wildlife Area. Nature Trust BC closed the area to the public after the winter 2021 ice storm and it remains locked. Our stewards have the combination for monthly maintenance parties. NTBC has informed us due to liability issues, the site cannot be opened to the public yet. <u>The June Picnic</u> planned for CRWA will be held at Cheam Lake Wetland Regional Park instead.
