- Our September 20th speaker Howard Bailey spoke in-person on Raptors. His photos were awesome but the demise of the Abbotsford peregrine nesting site was distressing.
- Jeremiah Kennedy of <u>Pacific Megascops Research</u>
 <u>Alliance</u> spoke via Zoom to members at the NLC and
 to others who were home. His presentation covered
 bioacoustic tracking of Western Screech Owls which
 are found in many habitats on Northern Vancouver
 Island.
- Coastal Partners in Conservation's, Aimee Mitchell spoke also via Zoom to both people in the NLC and at home. Aimee shared their work on restoration and monitoring of at risk species including western painted turtle, western screech owl, several bat species and raptors.

 Reifel Bird Sanctuary – two separate groups of Nature Chilliwack members visited Reifel in

November. On November 18th 38 species were recorded. The highlight was the Sandhill cranes but hand feeding chickadees & waterfowl was also great fun.

- 4. Camp River Wildlife Area: Recently the Nature Trust team planted willow whips along the Hope Slough area on the west edge of the property. The area remains closed to the public but members can join us at "coffee cutter" sessions on the 1st Saturday of the month at 9 AM for a firsthand look at this restored wildlife area.
