Area/Trail Length	7 Trails:		
	1. Heron Loop Trail 0.7 km. Circles the South Lagoon.		
	Part of the path is closed from March to July to protect heron		
	nesting site.		
	2. Salwein Creek Trail 0.5 km. Follows along North Lagoon, to		
	East blind loops back through wetland to main trail.		
	3. Centre Trail 0.7 km. Connects to Vedder Dyke trails east and west.		
	There are benches overlooking South Lagoon. Connects with		
	Tower Trail, the bird blind, viewing tower and Heron Loop Trail.		
	4. Vedder Rotary Trial West 3.6 km. Heads south on Centre Trail,		
	turns right parallel to river through forest, loops at gravel pit to the		
	dyke past heronry to the Rotary Interpretive Centre.		
	5. Vedder Rotary Trail East 3.6 km. Goes south on Centre Trail turns		
	left through forest along the river, under the railway bridge. At end		
	of forest trail a yellow gate leads to the dyke and finally to the		
	Rotary Interpretive Centre.		
	6. Discovery Trail 0.5 km. Trail goes through woods and along a		
	stream and pond.		
	7. Tower Trail 0.7 km Trail goes through forest then across the marsh		
	on boardwalks. Signs naming trees and forest ecosystems		
	Terrain relatively flat ground except for Tower Trail which has boardwalks.		
	Trails are wheelchair accessible but may be muddy after rain.		
Seasons to Visit	All year for walking, biking. Spring, winter and fall best for birding.
