	historic water intakes. To start the Lexw Qwò:m 500 metre trail, head uphill from the parking lot and turn left onto the bridge above the picnic area. The		
	walk is kid friendly but not stroller friendly. There are stairs and some steep areas. For those with physical impairments, take the relatively level gravel		
	trail at the east side of the parking lot to view mossy trees, the bridges and creeks. The Park has a longer 3 km uphill trail at the picnic area that leads to the Chilliwack Community Forest.
