- Vic Guinet shared slides of prospecting in the Yukon in the 1970's. Several club members worked to get these historic slides from basement shelf to a carousel to a functioning slide projector. Thanks Vic and Lynn Guinet.
- On October 17<sup>th</sup>, Drew Brayshaw, biologist and mushroom enthusiast, spoke. His comprehensive talk covered local mushrooms both edible and not. His speaker's mushroom hat and quality photographs were a pleasure.



- 3. In November John Elliot told us Drew Braysha surprising facts about our only truly aquatic songbird & year-round resident, the American dipper. Nests are built along fast running streams with one on a girder under Tamihi Creek bridge and another on a big bolder in the middle to the stream. Dippers have solid bones instead of hollow like other song birds. . FIELD TRIPS
- 1. Thank you to the Selles, for a most informative



geology and bird focused trip to Cheam Lake Wetlands Regional Park October 6<sup>th</sup>. Fernando pointed out the great prehistoric slide with rock

hummocks left behind as evidence as it approached the park. Paulina pointed out many birds. . Interesting mushrooms were found in the woods including ink caps, corals and vermilion waxy caps

 The October 15<sup>th</sup> field trip to the Chilliwack River Valley area to seek out all things mushroom attracted many NC members. The abundant mushrooms in colours of the rainbow and the spawning salmon reminded us how biodiverse our coastal rainforests are. Thank you to Lee Larkin & Denis Knopp for fungi identification.  The trip to the Harrison Lagoon November 19 to see the wintering waterfowl attracted 14 people including some visitors. The weather was appalling but we



managed to submit 19 species of birds to ebird including 11 Barrow's goldeneye, 2 American dippers and 108 buffleheads. Just before noon a wonderful rainbow lifted our spirits. A delicious lunch followed at Muddy Waters Café.
