- Febraury 20<sup>th</sup> Denis Knopp presented a comprehensive show on speiceis at risk in the Chilliwack Area. SAR range from the huge Rossevelt Elk to minute Dunn Skipper buterfly and elusive phantom orchids. Habitat loss, outdoor recreation pressure and climate change all conribute to species decline.
- Dr. Christine Bishop is a Research Scientist with Environment and Climate Change Canada will enlighten us about trends in populations of hummingbirds, their biology and her recent studies on pesticide exposure in the birds. She is our speaker for our AGM on Tuesday, March 19 2024.
