Research including citizen science is used to monitor the population. Juvenile fish are not as abundant as mature sturgeon. Habitat loss and climate change contributes to the decline.

## THIS N' THAT

- "Out of the Darkness" a Bat Exhibit sponsored by Nature Chilliwack, is coming to the Chilliwack Museum October 2024.
- 2. The exhibition has both a public education mission and will give Nature Chilliwack publicity. It highlights how essential bats are to the environment. It also provides a chance to celebrate these amazing creatures and foster stewardship within BC.
- 3. The cost to rent and to transport this travelling display to Chilliwack is close to \$1000. Many years ago member Valerie Whetter bequeathed us \$10,000 that is invested with Envision Credit Union where we bank. Money from this was used. The yearly interest from this GIC is used to pay rent for meetings, pay for speakers and for other club expenses.
- 4. Membership fees cover some club costs but from every paid membership, family or single, \$19 is paid to BC Nature. Membership alone cannot cover the costs of running our Club.
- 5. FVRL Bat Pack can be borrowed and used to monitor what bats are in your neighbourhood. Lee Larkin, who is the lead on this project, suggests 1-2 nights from June 1-21 and 1-2 nights from July 11 to August 5 to help NC compile a list of bats in our area.
